# What is the problem?

The 2009 Maryland Youth Risk Behavior Survey indicates that among high school students:

#### **Sexual Risk Behaviors**

- ever had sexual intercourse.
- – had sexual intercourse for the first time before 13 years.
- — had sexual intercourse with four or more persons during their life.
- — had sexual intercourse with at least one person during the 3 months before the survey.
- — did not use a condom during last sexual intercourse. (1)
- — did not use birth control pills or Depo-Provera before last sexual intercourse to prevent pregnancy. (1)
- 14% were never taught in school about AIDS or HIV infection.

### **Alcohol and Other Drug Use**

- — drank alcohol or used drugs before last sexual intercourse. (1)
- 3% used a needle to inject any illegal drug into their body one or more times during their life.

### What are the solutions?

Better health education • More comprehensive health services • More supportive policies

# What is the status?

The 2008 Maryland School Health Profiles indicates that among high schools:

#### **Health Education**

- 10% required students to take two or more health education courses.
- 90% taught 8 key pregnancy, HIV, or other STD prevention topics in a required course.
- 81% taught 3 key topics related to condom use in a required course.
- 95% taught how to access valid and reliable health information, products, or services related to HIV, other STDs, and pregnancy in a required course.
- 79% had a lead health education teacher who received professional development during the two years before the survey on HIV prevention.
- 58% had a lead health education teacher who received professional development during the two years before the survey on pregnancy prevention.

#### **Health Services**

• 84% had a full-time registered nurse.

### **Supportive Policies**

- 56% had policies on students or staff who have HIV infection or AIDS that addressed attendance of students with HIV infection, procedures to protect HIV-infected students and staff from discrimination, and maintaining confidentiality of HIV-infected students and staff.
- 53% had a gay/straight alliance or similar club.

- Among students who were currently sexually active.
