
What have we learned from the data?

9 out of 10 takers already met requirement.

45,569 of 50,539 test takers who took all 4 tests by June 2008

90.2% met!


Students who have taken all 4 tests and met requirement (by race)

Combined Score option

- Allows students to compensate for a lower score on one or more tests with a higher score in another content area.
- About 15% of students who met their requirement used the combined score option.


Bridge Plan for Academic Validation

- Two-year Task Force Study
 - Announced August 2007
- Reflects best of national models for alternative routes
- Successful Summer 2008 Pilot
 - Full-scale launch August 2008
- Addresses needs of special education and English language learners, and those with test anxiety

Bridge Plan for Academic Validation

- Instructional projects reflecting VSC and content on HSAs
- Students complete projects demonstrating their knowledge of content
- Projects are scored by content experts outside of the school
- Required number of projects determined by gap between HSA score and passing


Frequency distribution of Bridge Projects





Bridge Plan analysis for students who failed HSAs

- Modest project work required for students who failed to date
 - o Average of 2 or fewer projects per test
 - Average total number of projects for students failing four tests less than 8
- Many such students on parallel paths
 - o Retaking HSAs
 - Working on Bridge Plan projects

Individual Examination of Student Records

- Studied those not yet meeting requirement
- Fell into two groups
 - o Taken all 4 tests
 - o Not yet taken all 4 tests

- Total of 4,968 not met
- 470 within 5 points of 1602
- 3,693 (74%) need 5 or fewer projects
- 100 students with15-25 projects

Students needing to take 1 or 2 tests

Missing	Average number of Bridge Projects	Number of students
1 test	3.5	2,098
2 tests	1.1	719

- 51% are missing only one test—on average, they can score 82 points below the cut and still reach 1602.
- 1,477 have passed all of the tests they have taken.
- Over 2,000 are expected to pass their test(s) if they pass the course.
- 45 will reach 1602 just by taking their last test.

Students needing to take 3 or 4 tests

Missing	Number of students
3 tests	517
4 tests	759

- These students are likely to pass the HSAs if they successfully complete their courses.
- Some may not obtain sufficient course credits to graduate in four years.
- These students may be on track to graduate in five years or more.

Number and percent of students not yet taking 3 or 4 HSA courses and tests (by special services)





Conclusions

- Results are complex, but more complete than ever before
- 54,628 students must meet the requirement, and will do so on time
- With one-fourth of high school to go, those still working can make it
- Concern for small proportion facing tests for the first time senior year
