



Personalize the senior year

- Our schools KNOW their Bridge Plan students.
- The HSA graduation requirement ensures that no senior can be "anonymous" in Maryland.
- Individual, personal attention to those seniors *most in need*—those who have not yet demonstrated mastery of content and skills Maryland requires to earn a diploma.
- Focus on special populations
 - Students with IEP's
 - English Language Learners





Individualized Instruction

- Bridge projects are excellent, hands-on instructional tools
- Teachers across the state use bridge projects as models to develop high quality instructional materials that target the Core Learning Goals.



Individualized Instruction

- Project monitors are uniform in their praise:
 - "Can we use the projects in our classes during the year?"
 - "For the first time in my career, 'teaching to the test' makes me a better teacher"
 - "Classes run for project monitors working with the bridge projects are the best professional development sessions I have ever attended."
- Student voices:
 - "I can work at my own pace and get help from my teacher if I get stuck on part of the project."

Rigor and Fairness

- Project Development Process
 - Mirrors development of HSA items
 - Involves master teachers and graduates of the Governor's Academies
 - Bias/Sensitivity controls
- Scoring Center Operation and Feedback
 - Scorers must be content certified
 - Scoring center training required
 - State audits take place each term



Year-To-Date Data

Algebra Projects 448 Passed 198 Returned

Biology Projects 198 Passed 66 Returned

English Projects 347 Passed 159 Returned

Gov't Projects 146 Passed 120 Returned

■ Totals 1139 Passed 543 Returned

Most students focused on HSA review classes till October and took the HSA exam at that time

Year-To-Date Data

- Year-to-date, local scoring panels have approved 68% of projects completed by students.
- Results for special education and ELL students mirror results for all students.



Early "Lessons Learned" from Bridge Plan Implementation

- Success in implementing the Bridge Plan for Academic Validation relies on two things:
 - Students must work HARD to demonstrate mastery of content on projects.
 - Schools must provide quality, <u>INDIVIDUALIZED</u> instruction to ensure that students who want to earn a diploma do so.
- Superintendents have expressed to us that the HSA graduation requirement, including the Bridge Plan, provides them a great opportunity to improve the quality of instruction in their district.
